Dialog Rakyat's 'Harmoni-Mesra' and The Rukun Negara

What has been termed as the blueprint for our national unity was launched as the RUKUN NEGARA on August 31, 1970. It consists of two parts: the Principles and the Objectives. While we are constantly being reminded of the its five Principles (Belief in God, Loyalty to King and Country, Supremacy of the Constitution, Rule of Law, Ethical Behaviour & Morality), the Objectives are seldom highlighted.

The result is that many are unaware of the very important five Objectives which are: 1. Achieving a greater unity of her people, 2. Maintaining a democratic way of life, 3. Creating a just society with equitable sharing of prosperity, 4. Ensuring a liberal approach to the country's rich and diverse cultural traditions and 5. Building a progressive society by harnessing modern science and technology. These Objectives can be summed up as our National Aspiration for a Harmonious, Prosperous, Progressive, and Sustainable (HPPS) Malaysia.



I feel as a nation we are guilty of negligence, of ignoring the Objectives, of failure to commit and of not translating them into effective actionable practices, beyond just reciting the Principles. Take the Harmonious component of HPPS, which encapsulates Objectives I and 4; we are still a long way from achieving it.

Polarising forces in the form of divisive and toxic rhetorics, cultural ignorance combined with cultural arrogance and interfaith intolerance are still rampant. In short, national cohesion and social harmony still cannot be taken for granted.

To counter the unhealthy situation and explore actionable practices to promote sustained harmony, the Dialog Rakyat for National Cohesion and Unity was established in 2016. This was the initiative of a group of civil society organisations comprising PCORE, PAGE, MINDS, National Building School, G25, Insaf Malaysia, Yayasan Perpaduan Malaysia and NCWO with ASLI initially providing the secretariat support, which currently is undertaken by KSI Strategic Institute for Asia Pacific.

Between 2016 and 2019 nine Dialog Rakyat were convened involving concerned individuals, school and university communities and neighbourhood communities. The Harmoni-Mesra (H-M) concept, principles and practices and the Dialog Rakyat Code of Ethical Conduct (CEC), are the outcomes from these dialogues. Promoting H-M Malaysian Communities and Nurturing H-M Generations for Malaysia become the Strategic Mission of Dialog Rakyat, with 'Harmoni-Mesra Saling Hormati', a contribution from PCORE, as the theme song and the CEC as the 'tataperadaban' for H-M.

One actionable practice for H-M, is the Harmoni-Mesra Campus proposal which comprises two components: acceptance of the principles and basic framework of H-M, and implementation of the operational framework, i.e., integration into the functions of the university, namely governance and administration, teaching and research, community and industry outreach, advocacy and advice,

international collaboration and students extracurricular activities.

It is most heartening and encouraging for the Dialog Rakyat community and for me personally that UCSI University has embraced the H-M concept and has taken the lead to implement the Harmoni-Mesra Campus Programme and to work towards the aspiration of getting the participation of Malaysian university communities. I see this as another of UCSI University's contributions towards the achievement of the objectives of Rukun Negara. Kudos to UCSI University.

On August 31, 1970, the Rukun Negara (National Principles) was established to mark Malaysia's 13th anniversary of independence. It was implemented in the wake of the May 13 incident in 1969, which had led to racial riots in Malaysia.







Keluarga Malaysia is an emphasis on the "H" component of HPPS. The newly proclaimed Madani by the new government, which comprises sustainability, care and compassion, respect, innovation, prosperity and trust, is an expression of HPPS, heavy on the H component: care and compassion, respect and trust being both the requirements for and the outcome of 'Harmonious'.

HPPS represents the **CONSISTENCY PARADIGM** for Malaysia's National Aspiration.





It is a forum for exchanging ideas and exploring actionable practices by individual citizens and citizen groups to counter the untenable situation.

The Harmoni-Mesra concept, principles and practices and the Code of Ethical Conduct emerged from the discussions taking place during 2016 and 2019. One actionable practice manifestation of Harmoni-Mesra is the Harmoni-Mesra Campus proposal.

The Dialog Rakyat code of ethical conduct is the 'tataperadaban' for Harmoni-Mesra.





Dialog Rakyat Code Of Ethical Conduct For National Cohesion And Unity

We, the Concerned and Responsible Citizens of Malaysia undertake therefore to adopt a set of behavioural patterns that embodies Moderation, Respect, Understanding, Trust, Transparency, Tolerance and Accommodation that reflects:

- Respect for one another regardless of ethnicity, religion, geographical region, status or political leaning.
- Recognition of our similarities and acceptance of our differences.



We, the Concerned and Responsible Citizens of Malaysia agree to:

- Respect the Federal Constitution and uphold the Rukunegara so as to preserve the independence and sovereignty of our nation.
- Promote activities that nurture civic consciousness, civic nationalism, patriotism, national cohesiveness, harmony, and unity at all levels of society.
- Advocate justice and fairness, transparency and integrity in all aspects of management and governance.
- Resolve contentions and differences through constructive engagement always seeking for equitable, mutually beneficial outcomes.
- Refrain from actions that offend, insult, humiliate, or intimidate others.
- Reject any form of discrimination, bigotry, extremism,
 unjustified acts causing harm to any individual or group,
 including any actions that can disrupt harmony and cohesion.
- •Fight corruption and kleptocracy at all levels and in all its manifestations.



Actionable Practices By The University Communities - Outcome of Dialog Rakyat 3 (22 May, 2017) Jointly Convened With UKM, UPM, UCSI University and MAHSA University

"Conscious of the fact that national cohesion and unity are of prime importance in our national aspiration to be a harmonious, prosperous, progressive and sustainable Malaysia, universities in Malaysia attending the Dialog Rakyat 3 on 22nd of May, 2017 are in agreement that we have a crucial role to play in promoting and fostering cohesion, harmony and unity, among students and in the general citizenry.

The academic community undertake to abide by and to promote to our students the Dialog Rakyat Code of Ethical Conduct and be guided by its set of behavioural patterns that embodies moderation, respect, understanding, trust, transparency, tolerance and accommodation which reflect respect for other persons regardless of ethnicity, religion, geographical region, status and political leaning.



We will refrain from action that offend, insult, humiliate or intimidate, and will uphold justice, fairness, transparency and integrity in all our dealings with others and will impart these values to our students.

We undertake to promote and foster national cohesion, harmony and unity as well as patriotism, civic nationalism, and civic consciousness as part of our responsibility through one or several of the programmes and activities to be identified which are within our authority to implement In particular we will be focusing on the following aspects:

- ★ Embedding positive values and relevant soft skills that encourage cohesion, harmony and unity into teaching and learning activities.
- ★ Incorporate positive values and relevant soft skills through courses or curricular activities, through students extracurricular activities, through personal conduct and interactions, through community interactions and engagement, and through the educators themselves.

We undertake to also promote the above to other universities in Malaysia.

FROM HARMONY MOMENTS TO 'HARMONI-MESRA' FOR SUSTAINED SOCIAL HARMONY

Although Rukun Negara, the blueprint for national unity, was launched some 53 years ago, Academician Professor Emeritus Tan Sri Dr Omar Abdul Rahman believes that we Malaysians while being adept at parroting the principles, often forget about its objectives. "National cohesion and unity still cannot be taken for granted. At this point, social harmony continues to be under threat and sustained harmony or kesejahteraan negara remains a dream." The social malaise in Malaysia has him ill at ease, and therefore it is his goal to promote enduring harmony with the implementation of Harmoni-Mesra, the concept, principles, and practices of which were developed by Dialog Rakyat building on harmony moments.





"We may be enjoying many harmony moments in Malaysia, coming together to celebrate Merdeka Day, Malaysia Day, waving the Jalur Gemilang and singing patriotic songs, to celebrate our various festivals, to support our teams in many sporting events."

"These are short term social events and we need to build upon these harmony moments with the rational reasons for stronger long term social bonding and that is what Harmoni-Mesra is about."

The most important part is harmonious, without which you cannot have the other three components. Countries with disharmony suffer from the five Dreadful Ds: disruption, displacement, destruction, disfigurement, and death.

There are many examples around the world today. Harmoni-Mesra is about addressing the Harmonious component to achieve HPPS. >>

"Ah yes about the Harmony Awards. The idea came up in 2018. I was making a presentation at the UCSI University Students and Alumni Affairs Lecture on 6th March of that year. The topic was 'Sustained Harmony - The Pre-Requisite for Malaysia 2050'."



"At the end of the of the presentation I posed a question What can UCSI University students do to promote sustained harmony in Malaysia. I reminded them about the Oxford English Dictionary's word of the year for 2017, which was YOUTHQUAKE, meaning a significant cultural, political or social change arising from the actions or the influence of young people."

"What about UCSI University Students YOUTHQUAKE for sustained harmony in Malaysia was my challenge to the students. And I offered two proposals as starters."

First was "students initiated Annual Public Lecture on National Cohesion, Unity and Harmony, covering aspects of national heritage, cultures, values and National Aspiration. My talk this morning can be the inaugural lecture."

"My second proposal was to initiate a UCSI Students Harmony
Awards, for individuals or groups, for students activities
promoting social harmony on or off campus."

Tan Sri Omar later donated the fund for the cash prizes of RM 1000, 600 and 400, for the first three years.

The inaugural awards ceremony took place on 1st October 2019 officiated by the then Minister of Education, Dr Maszlee Malik. Our Datuk Vice Chancellor, Professor Dr. Hamisah Tapsir then as Chief Secretary (Ketua Setiausaha-KSU) of Ministry of Education (MOE) also was present on that occasion.

"The UCSI Students Harmony Awards was my suggested name, but the University Council overruled me. Now that it is called the way it is, don't anybody dare to change it." Omar quipped in jest. The TSO Harmony Awards is now an integral part of the UCSI Harmoni-Mesra Campus Programme. And with increased cash prizes, the Awards have now gone national. The USCI University Council has now decided to name the awards as the Tan Sri Omar Harmoni-Mesra Awards.


On Harmoni-Mesra, Noraini believes that Harmoni is the result when people can live in unity and peace.

Having lived in a Federal Land Development Authority, commonly known to Malaysians as FELDA, Noraini recounted an interracial story that evokes feelings of what Harmoni-Mesra means to her, "My mother had a grocery store and the majority of the people living in the area were Malay. I remember during rainy days they couldn't go over to the rubber plantations for some time – so many of them had to live on buku tiga lima – it was a book in

which you could write down what you bought and what you owed. I was helping my mother and so, I wrote a lot in it. My mother's supplier who was also her good friend was a Chinese guy from Kota Tinggi. He too, would allow my mother to get the items in stock first and pay later. Rice, sugar and all the essential necessities. And this is how people of different backgrounds come together to support each other."

Dr Mabel fondly remembered as a young child about her move from her hometown in Sungai Petani, Kedah to Kuala Lumpur during her childhood. "Weeks before we had to move, there was the sense of muhibbah – the neighbours in the kampung invited my family for farewell dinners and parties.

On the day of the move, the whole neighbourhood came together

– they were helping us load furniture onto the lorry. There were
hugs, kisses and tears all around from our Malay, Chinese and
Indian neighbours. That sort of togetherness – this is what
Harmoni-Mesra is all about."

During the floods of December 2021 when a group of Malaysians were abruptly displaced, UCSI College hosted a live-streaming charity event. "We managed to raise RM30,000. Simultaneously, UCSI University was having their music charity event 'Flood Relief Concert Donation Drive' where the patron was YAM Tunku Zain Al-'Abidin ibni Tuanku Muhriz – we collected RM70,000.

When we pooled the funds together, UCSI as a group channelled RM100,000 to the Ministry of Higher Education's 'Tabung Bantuan Banjir', Lions Club KL and Malaysian Red Crescent (Selangor) to aid in their respective flood relief initiatives.

It was a good moment as in these events, we saw our students of different races coming together to help.

Harmoni-Mesra Experience

Lucas Lim was a volunteer in the UCSI Vaccination Centre (PPV) and it was during his volunteering work he noticed that some of the people who came for vaccination were poor and looking for help. "Many of them were jobless and suffering. I feel that we need to plan something to help our society, many of them were reaching out for support especially for food assistance and it was that cry for help that initiated the idea to set up Food Bank in the UCSI PPV, the first PPV in Malaysia which also provided the public

especially the vulnerable communities with food assistance and also counseling support.

The programme received contribution of various essential goods such as rice, oil, instant noodles, canned food, biscuits along with cash worth more than RM50,000 in total. The Food Bank programme had helped more than 3,000 families around Klang Valley.

My Lifetime Harmoni-Mesra Experience

For me, Harmoni Mesra means three important things. Firstly, the idea of according dignity to all regardless of race, culture, faith and ideology. Secondly, it is the admission by ourselves that we will always need others from the differences that God has created so as to complete ourselves socially, economically and spiritually. Thirdly, our mortality is our most common denominator and that our biology is transferable between us regardless of what our social, religious or political narratives are.



I have not one incident of Harmony Mesra to share but a life time of learning and living experiences. In Sekolah Rendah St'Marks, Butterworth, from Primary 1 to Primary 6, I was taught by all non-Malay and non-Muslim teachers from many different races. They were all nurturing and dedicated and I never felt being discriminated or isolated. In Sekolah Menengah Jenis Kebangsaan Hua Lian, Taiping, from Form 2 to Lower Six, almost all my teachers were non-Malays and non-Muslims. Again, they were all caring, professional and non-discriminatory. They taught

with love, passion and honour till I overcame many of my weaknesses in academic subjects. My all Chinese school mates also supported me and helped me through my education. When I went to the United States of America for my Bachelors and Masters in Architecture, my teachers were also all non-Muslim. It was in the USA that I rediscovered Islam as a spiritual, social and political force of development for humanity (The Madani Islam concept). Later on, I was supervised by another non-Muslim scholar for my PhD on The Mosque as a Community Development Center.



After the sacking of Anwar Ibrahim in 1998, my political awakening led to a career as a columnist in many main stream media like Utusan Malaysia, The Star, Borneo Post, Sin Chew Daily, Sinar Harian, Freemalaysiatoday, Malaysiakini and Malaysian Insider. My writings seek to realign the Malays to a centrist position of Madani Islam but the establishment reacted against my writings and placed my career in cold storage. Upon my optional retirement as the most senior and youngest Professor of Architecture with more than 50 books published, public universities spurned my services. Again, a non-Malay and

non-Muslim Malaysian saved my career by appointing me Professor at UCSI University. In 2018, after suffering a heart attack, my cardiologists had prepped me for a heart by-pass surgery. He advised me to get 8 blood donors. After asking friends and students for help, 6 Chinese males and females donated blood for me. These six were the friends of my students whom I do not know at all! Although I never went through the by-pass because an emergency angioplasty was able to miraculously be performed, I have never forgotten the selfless deeds of the six Chinese donors.



I have concluded that my life and career would not have been possible without the aid of others who are not of my own faith and culture. God has created differences and opposites in nature for it to thrive and we would be fools to dishonor His creations. Our differences is both our destiny and salvation.
